Introduction

AWiA's beneficiary numbers and impact have continued to grow over the years! We are very proud of the progress our team has made in 2023. In this report we will review our wins and losses from last year and give you an overview of our vision for this year.

AWiA's agribusiness projects intend to secure the future of food security by fostering the establishment of backyard and community vegetable gardens for beneficiaries from Alexandra, Orange Farm, Jackson, Soweto, Cosmo City and Thembisa, thus building a network of new female community farmers and shortening food miles.

Our agripreneurship programs in 2023 were well attended, featured 182 female and 35 male beneficiaries, making the total for the year 217 beneficiaries. Our reach extended to areas like Alexandra, Cosmo City, Jackson and Thembisa for the first time.

The state of unemployment and urban food security challenges in South Africa have created the need for innovative solutions, such as collaborative community gardens. Nowhere is this being more clearly demonstrated than by Balwin, African Women in Agriculture (AWiA), Thembalami (BAT) Community Garden in Lombardy East.

The BAT project aims to secure the future of food by fostering the establishment of community and urban vertical vegetable gardens for beneficiaries from Alexandra. Thus, building a network of new female community farmers and shortening food miles.



AWiA in the Spotlight

AWiA was afforded a platform to speak on Agriculture at a number of events, including the National Youth Day Celebrations in Mangaung Stadium, Bloemfontein, attended by over 40 thousand young people and viewed on National TV.

The AWiA team were also interviewed on SABC 3, two episodes of the Food for Mzansi podcasts and a Women's Day event.


In total AWiA's message on empowerment through agriculture was directly disseminated to over 1 000 people.

Only 41% of our beneficiaries got to the stage where they managed to consume and only 10% showed evidence of sales for the harvest of their backyard produce.


Achievements 2023

- Our organsational efficiency increased- we reached more beneficiaries with a smaller funding pool.
- A total of 217 beneficiaries empowered in Alexander, Jackson, Soweto, Orange Farm, Ennerdale and Thembisa.

Year on Year Progress

- We received 80% of the previous year's funding,
- Beneficiary numbers on a smaller budget increased by 60%,
- AWiA's reach increased from 4 locations to 8 locations
- Vegetable donations to ECD (Early childhood development) Centres for the first time.
- We distributed 160% more AmaVeggie pyramids for higher impact.

Beneficiary Profile

- Women (and men) aged 23 55, LSM 1- 4
- 80% Completed their high school education (Matric)
- 10% completed a Degree/ Diploma
- 80% contract workers, 20% serial entrepreneurs
- 60% have never had a job




AWiA Agricultural Resilience Framework
